SPINELLI ARRIVES -

BERNARDES RETURNS TO BRAZIL: AIRPORT FAREWELL

MR. PIERRE PASQUALE SPINELLI, UNITED NATIONS UNDER-SECRETARY AND DIRECTOR-GENERAL OF THE U.N. Office at Geneva, arrived in Nicosia last Wednesday evening (4 January) to act temporarily as the Secretary-General's Special Representative in Cyprus following the departure of Mr. Carlos A. Bernardes who resigned his post last month, after more than two years on the island.

Mr. Spinelli was greeted at the airport by representatives of the Cyprus Government, members of the foreign diplomatic corps in Cyprus, Mr. Bernardes, Lieutenant-General A.E. Martola, the Force Commander, and other UNFICYP officials.

Speaking briefly to reporters at the airport, Mr. Spinelli stressed the "temporary" aspect of his assignment to Cyprus which, he said, would last only until the Secretary-General appoints a successor to Mr. Bernardes.

Recalling his initial assignment to Cyprus in the same

capacity, in March 1964 when the United Nations operation was first established in Cyprus, Mr. Spinelli said that he would continue to act within the strict terms of reference of Special Representative of the Secretary-General; he had no new plans or initiatives, he added.

Mr. Bernardes left Nicosia on the following morning (5 January). He was seen off at the airport by representatives of the Cyprus Government, members of the diplomatic corps, Mr. Spinelli, General Martola and other UNFICYP officials, and other friends and colleague in Cyprus. Mr. Bernardes resigned his post for "personal reasons" and will be returning to Brazil, his native country.

DER SKER ALT FOR MANGE FAERSELSUHED PÅ CYPERN, HVORI DANSKE KØRETOJER ER IMPLICERET. Nok har Cyrioterne ikke det, vi forstår ved færdselskultur, men deres måde at færdes på kræver så meget desto mere forsigtighed fra vor side. Siden 15 NOV 1966 er der sket 11 færdselsulykker og -uhed, som danske køretojer har været impliceret i. De fleste ha heldigvis ikke været af alvorligere karakter, men dog er en dansk og en cyriot blevet alvorligt kvæstet, medens en cyriot er lettere kvæstet.

Der har alt ialt inden for de sidste 12 måneder været behandlet 179 færdselssager, hvoraf en meget stor del har været overskridelse af hastighedsbestemmelserne. Last Wednesday a Wessex helicopter of 72 Squadron Detachment RAF, piloted by Flt Lt Peter Faid and crewed by Master Signaller "Taff" Hughes, left RAF Nicosia in response to a "CASE-VAC" call. The call was received at 1045 hrs. By 1112 hrs the patient had been delivered to BMH Dhekelia after collection from the Austrian Field Hospital at Kokkinatrimithia, six miles north west of Nicosia. Total time for the whole operation was twenty-seven minutes.

LIFE HAS PRIORITY

DESPITE A RECENT IMPROVEMENT IN THE ACCIDENT FIGURES FOR FORCE VEHICLES, SAFETY EXPERTS AT FORCE HEADQUARTERS FEEL THAT THE ACCIDENT RATE IS STILL FAR TOO HIGH. During the following weeks, The BLUE BERET will be carrying a series of features designed to remind drivers of some obvious but easily forgotten rules of driving — rules they followed when they began driving, but have allowed to lapse through familiarity or perhaps carelessness. Any machine depends on the person who runs it, and this applies specially to the motor car. The most important part of a car is the driver. There is no such thing as a fool-

proof or crash-proof car, there is even no such thing as an automatic car. Safety can be designed into a vehicle up to a certain point — the rest depends on the driver. This is the point the UNFICYP Safety Committee want to make. Intelligent use of vehicles can cut the number of accidents.

Few drivers will ever admit that they were the cause of an accident they were involved in — it is always 'the other fellow's fault.' When a man gets into a car his whole psychological make-up seems to change. Given an almost unlimited source of power he often becomes careless to the point of stupidity and completely thoughtless of other peoples'

For those members of UNFICYP recently arrived, they may be interested to know that complete sets of albums of United Nations postage stamps for the years 1964, 1965 and 1966 are available at the UNFICYP office in the Forceariat, Main Hangar, UNF Headquarters, Nicosia.

Also available are some first-day covers of the UNPA stamp issue due out in December, honouring the work of the United Nations Children's Fund.

UN Post administration plans for the year include an issue of a new stamp on 23 January to commemorate

the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) — see photo insert with this column.

The UN Development Programme, which is conducting



the world's largest programme of multi-lateral technical aid to developing countries, combines the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance estab-


lished in 1950, and the UN Special Fund founded in 1959. Current project commitments amount to well over 1,000 million US dollars.

The new stamp will be printed in photogravure by Courvoisier SA (Switzerland) in denominations of 5-cents (yellow, purple, green and orange) and 11-cents (blue, green, brown and orange). Due to an overrun in printing quantities, 2,380,000 stamps of the 5-cent denominations will be issued and 2,170,000 of the 11-cent denomination, rather than 2,200,000 and 2,000,000 as originally announced. The stamp was designed by Olav S. Matisen (Denmark) and will measure 34mm horizontally x 26 mm vertically, perforation to perforation.



A NEW ROAD SAFETY SERIES

PART I

DEFENSIVE DRIVING

safety.

Once in a jam of traffic, you whole point changes. You can't see the cause, often far off, your constant slowing down and speed. You can't see round corners — impatience breeds carelessness — then you are halfway there — you can't read some mind — and things can suddenly join the ever rising static

them. This is sometimes called 'Defensive Driving'. All this implies alertness, a reasonable amount of courtesy, and most important, a safety margin — a reserve of space and time. SPACE is the minor problem, it is fairly easy to leave a reasonable space between yourself and any vehicles in front, but TIME is more important. Time depends on two factors, thinking time and acting time — the time between you seeing an incident that requires you to stop or take other action and the time that you actually complete that action.

You know in front stops suddenly — a child runs without being prepared for

have time to stop, but on the other hand, too sudden action may result in cars behind you not being able to stop. The faster you travel the greater the margin of space and therefore time should be. A safe margin is at least one car's length for each ten miles per hour, but allow more space for high speeds, on slippery roads, or in darkness.

One note of caution: The safety margin can be overdone, particularly in slow, heavy traffic. Leaving too much space in front of you is simply an invitation for other drivers to pass in circumstances which may not be safe for them to do so. Play it safe, but don't overdo it.

SUOMEN PATALJOONASSA PELATAAN SALAMAPALLOA

SALAMAPALLO, RUGBYN SUOMALAINEN VERSIO, JOKA SEROAA ESIKUVASTAAN LÄHINÄ SIKÄLI ETTÄ RAJUT TAKLAUKSET ON korvattu polttoosketuksella, mikä vähentää loukaantumisen vaaraa kovalta kenttäpinnalla on pääsemässä käyttöön pataljoonassa. Pelin on Kyproksella tuonut ja miehilleme opettanut Suomen salamapalloliiton varapuheenjohtaja Tarmo Mäki-Kuutti, joka nyt siirtyy muutamaksi päiväksi Famagustaan viemään suippo palloaan ruotsalaistenkin paikittavaksi. Alustavasti on jo suunniteltu maaottelun järjestämistä kontingentin kesken.

Kolmen jääkärikomppanian väillä käydessä salamapallo-ottelujen harjoitussarjassa saavutti toinen komppania lyöimaisen voiton kilpakumppaneistaan näiden tarjoamasta kovasta vastuksesta huolimatta. 2.K:n joukkue kukiisti ykkösen 5-3 ja kolmannen komppanian peräti 7-0. Early in the second half the Army took the lead with a penalty goal, but soon lost it when Lt Quirk kicked another penalty.





SEVEN THOUSAND MILE LINK

WEEKLY YUKON FLIGHT KEEPS CANCON OPERATING



BIG DAY FOR CANCON — No less than fifteen vehicles from Camp Maple Leaf swarm onto Nicosia airport to take much needed freight and mail from the weekly Yukon flight from Canada. The ten 3-ton Bedfords involved make two trips before everything is off-loaded. And the twenty-strong loading party has everything transferred or put away well within the two-hour turn-around period.

are peculiar to Canada. There are something like 150 Canadian military vehicles maintained by flying out spare parts and sometimes whole sections. As the vehicles age, the requirement ups. It's the same with radio equipment. And, as well as the need for mail from home, the Canadian soldier gets important little extras to the basic British ration system.

"People count time left on tour by how many aircraft departures to go before their turn", said Captain Vatra, and it would really take something extraordinary to detract from the arrival of the weekly Yukon flight.

The four-fan Yukon of the Royal Canadian Air Force arrives Mondays in Nicosia loaded with roughly 20,000 pounds of freight and thirty-three passengers for Cyprus and for the UN Emergency Force's Canadian Contingent in the Middle East. More important is the 2,000 pounds or so of mail it brings.

So far, this Canadian link has carried something like two and a quarter million pounds of freight, a few thousand people rotating here and in UNEF on a man-for-man basis, and a quarter-million pounds of mail. This is based on statistics going back to September, 1964, when the UNFICYP mandate was renewed for the first time.

In Cyprus alone, the current Contingent brings to 6,000 the total number of servicemen Canada has contributed on six-month tours. Canadians (1st Bn, R 22e R) in fact were the first troops to arrive when the Force formed in the Spring of 1964. It took thirty RCAF flights and a sea lift by the Royal Canadian Navy's aircraft carrier Bonaventure to establish them.

Since then, the various battalions have been rotated in an operation separate from the weekly service flight.

The bulk of Contingent needs are met through arrangements with the British SBAs, but some material and welfare requirements

factors crop up which at times one flight per week can't handle — material piles up at Trenton which the Contingent needs — then Canada's Air Transport Command steps in with a special air freighter service.

Since HMCS Bonaventure came

in March 1964, only a few tons

of freight annually comes by sea

through the port of Famagusta.

Captain Vatra and his staff are

responsible for this too.

U THANT CONTINUES EFFORTS TO GET TALKS GOING

HUMAN RIGHTS EXPERTS COMMITTEE OPENS SESSION

WAYS AND MEANS OF PREVENTING DISCRIMINATION AND PROTECTING MINORITIES are being examined in detail by a unit of the United Nations Commission on Human Rights which opened a new session at UN Headquarters last week.

The sub-commission of experts, recently enlarged to eighteen members, makes recommendations to its parent body seeking to do away with discrimination of any kind affecting human rights, and to protect racial, national, religious and linguistic minorities.

Since its establishment in 1947, the group has initiated a series of world-wide studies on various forms of discrimination, among them discrimination in matters of education, employment, political rights and religious rights and practices. In 1964 it approved the draft text of the International Convention against all forms of racial discrimination which was subsequently adopted by the General Assembly. In 1965 the sub-commission drew up a draft convention seeking the elimination of all forms of religious intolerance.

As the new session opened, the sub-commission re-elected Mr W. Ketrzynski of Poland as its chairman. Welcoming members on behalf of the Secretary-General, Marc Schreiber, Director of UN's Human Rights Division, noted the successful contributions already made by the group to the international effort to secure fundamental freedoms. He stressed the great importance attached by the world Organization to eliminating problems of discrimination.

THE EFFORTS OF THE SECRETARY-GENERAL TO BRING ABOUT NEGOTIATIONS FOR THE END OF THE WAR IN VIET-NAM CONTINUED TO BE THE MAIN FOCUS OF ATTENTION at United Nations Headquarters as the New Year got under way. A spokesman for the Secretary-General said on Thursday that he could neither deny nor confirm published reports that he had "hard facts" to support his hope that, if the United States would end the bombing of Viet-Nam without any prior conditions, there would be a positive response from North Viet-Nam with a view to the general de-escalation of the fighting and to starting negotiations between all parties to the conflict.

At the same time, the spokesman drew attention to a statement made by U Thant in a letter addressed to US Ambassador Arthur Goldberg on New Year's eve to the effect that he felt hopeful that favourable developments might follow if the Americans halted the bombing without prior conditions, and if the brief New Year cease-fire could be extended.

U Thant's letter to Ambassador Goldberg was sent in reply to a request made by the United States on December 19 that the Secretary-General take whatever steps he considered necessary to bring about discussions leading to a cease-fire.

The Secretary-General urged the United States to take the initiative in the quest for peace in Viet-Nam and show "an enlightened and humanitarian spirit" by stopping the bombing of North Viet-Nam "even without conditions". He also urged an extension of the cease-fire period. He said cessation of the bombing should be followed by the next two points in his three point programme for getting peace talks started — a scaling down of all military activities by all sides, and an expression of willingness to talk with all those fighting, including the Viet-Cong.

In the subsequent reply, sent the same day, Ambassador Goldberg reiterated the previous American statement that she was prepared to order "a prior end" to all bombing of the North "the moment there is an assurance, private or otherwise, that there would be a reciprocal response towards peace from North Viet-Nam".

He added the hope that U Thant would use every means at his disposal to determine what tangible response there would be from the North to the cessation of bombing. At the same time, the US Ambassador expressed his Government's conviction that the goal of peace in Viet-Nam could not be attained "by either appeals or, or exercise of, restraint by only one side".

Ambassador Goldberg said the United States welcomed the idea of an extended cease-fire which, he noted, would involve the cessation of bombing of the North and an end to all hostilities and organized violence in the South — but could not but regret "that other parties concerned have shown no interest so far in such a cease-fire".

Over last week-end it was reported that North Viet-Nam and the Viet-Cong had proposed a limited extension of the truce arranged to cover the Viet-Namese New Year of February eighth to twelfth, from four to seven days. US Secretary of State, Dean Rusk, told the press that American agreement to this proposal would call for prior consultation with its allies, and in particular, the South Viet-Nam government.
