Mr. Ralph J. Bunche, UN Under-Secretary for Special Political Affairs, left on Monday morning after a three-day visit to Cyprus during which he conferred with Mr. Carlos A. Bernardes, Special Representative of the Secretary-General in Cyprus, and Major-General A.E. Martola, Commander of the UN Force in Cyprus, on matters pertaining to the operation of UNFICYP.

Mr. Bunche arrived on Friday noon, 8 July, and was met at the airport by the Cyprus Foreign Minister, Mr. Spyros Kyprianou, Mr. Bernardes, Gen. Martola, other UNFICYP officials, and members of the diplomatic corps in Nicosia.

Speaking to reporters at the airport, Mr. Bunche said that he was glad to be back in Cyprus — he was last here in April 1964 shortly after the Force became operational. He reiterated as announced in New York when he left, that his travels were related to routine trips to UN peace-keeping operations in the area. Inasmuch as peace-keeping operations are his main responsibility on behalf of the Secretary-General, he said, he usually tries to visit them once a year for the purpose of sitting down with the heads of the operations and going over their activities and their problems.

Before coming to Cyprus, Mr. Bunche spent a few days in Gaza conferring with Major-General I. J. Rikhye and his Headquarters staff and travelled along the Armistice Demarcation Line. He then went to Jerusalem and conferred there with Lt. General Odd Bull, Chief of Staff of the UN Truce Supervision Organisation in Jerusalem and



UNFICYP's MP - kompagni

Udover det rene danske MP-kommando ved DANCON, der i alt bestaaer af 14 mand, indgaar der ogsaa dansk militærpoliti i UNFICYP's militærpolitikkompagni. Kompagniet er paa 64 mand hvoraf 17, med kompagnichefen, major H.E. Nilsson i spidsen, er danske. Kompagniet har en trafiksektion paa 16 mand, 6 mand er stationeret i Limassol og 2 i Famagusta, medens 40 mand i Nicosia danner vagtholdene, der varetager den gentlige ordenspolitimæssige tjeneste. Vagtholdene arbejder efter canadiske retningslinier, men er sammensat af folk fra alle nationer, der har kontingenter ved UNFICYP, saaledes at selv de enkelte patruljer ikke skulle kunne komme ud for sprogvanskeligheder.





FN-kassam damer besökte 1. komp






HQ's BRITCON Round-up



Black Watch Recce Platoon

The Reconnaissance Platoon of the 2nd Battalion The Black Watch (RHR) of Canada occupy Mystery House in the north west suburbs of Nicosia. Under command of B Squadron, 8th Canadian Hussars (Princess Louise's) commanded by Major J.A. St Aubin, the platoon shares long range patrol tasks and occupies two outposts in Nicosia. The platoon is commanded by Captain A.J. MacDonald of Sydney, Nova Scotia. The Second in Command, Sergeant E.J. Long, of Ludlow, New Brunswick, cares for the platoon's administrative needs.

In addition to static outpost duties and long range patrolling, the platoon also doubles as CANCON's heavy support group. For this role they are equipped with jeep mounted .50 caliber machine guns and 106 mm recoilless rifles.

Each man in the platoon, in addition to being trained on his support weapon, is an expert at patrolling both on foot and by vehicle. Advanced skills in map reading and radio technique are constantly practiced and a high standard is maintained through a continuous training programme.

New stamp to be issued



The United Nations Postal Administration has announced that it will issue a stamp to commemorate the International Coffee Agreement of 1962 on 19 September 1966.

The new stamp, designed by Rashid-ud Din (Pakistan), will be printed in four-colour photogravure by the Government Printing Office, Tokyo, Japan. The 5-cent and 11-cent denominations will be printed in quantities of 2,200,000 and 2,000,000 respectively. The stamp will measure 34 mm. horizontally x 26 mm. vertically, perforation to perforation.

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European UN stamp fans will be treated this summer to the visit by the United Nations Postal Administration's mobile exhibit. This follows the successful cross-country tour of the United States last year by the big white tractor-trailer, emblazoned with the United Nations insignia, which was first envisaged by UN Under-Secretary, Mr. David B. Vaughan, Director of General Services at the United Nations, which includes the UNPA.

Under present tentative plans, the UN's walk-through stampmobile will crisscross some 18 European countries for about three months beginning in August. This tour will cover the following countries: Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, England, the Federal Republic of Germany, Finland, France, Hungary, Italy, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Rumania, Sweden, and Yugoslavia.

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In Cyprus, the UNPA exhibit — "United Nations in Action" — will wind up on Saturday its two-week exhibition stand in Nicosia. It will be on view every day this week at the Turkish Central Library in Attaturk Square.

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The "United Nations Special Fund" stamp, which was issued on 26 January 1965, will have its last day of sale on 25 July 1966.

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The 15-cent ICI stamp, issued on 26 June 1965, was sold out on 19 April 1966.

GREAT BRITAIN MAKES FURTHER \$ THREE MILLION CONTRIBUTION TO UNFICYP

The United Kingdom informed the UN Secretary-General, U Thant, that she will make a voluntary contribution of two million dollars towards the up-keep of the United Nations Peace-Keeping Force in Cyprus during the six-month period from June until 26th December of this year.

Great Britain also said that it would contribute one million dollars to help meet the deficit of some three million dollars which still faces the UN Cyprus operation.



On 5 July, Lieutenant Colonel H.J. Harkes, MC, CD, arrived in Cyprus to assume command of the 2nd Battalion The Black Watch (RHR) of Canada. The official handing over between Lt Col Harkes and Lt Col Duncan A. McAlpine will take place at Oneisha Farm on Thursday. Colonel G. R. Hale, Commander CANCON, will be the senior officer presiding at the ceremony. Lt Col Harkes comes to Kyrenia District from the United States Marine Corps Command and General Staff College in Quantico, Virginia.

U Thant winds up European trip in Iceland

U THANT, UN Secretary-General, last week paid a two-day official visit to Iceland winding up his recent European trip. He returned the UN Headquarters on Saturday.

In welcoming him to Iceland, President Asgrísson expressed the hope that U Thant would agree to serve for another term as UN Secretary-General.

En route to Iceland, U Thant made a half-hour stop-

over in Copenhagen, Denmark. While there he reiterated his view that there was a growing consciousness in Europe of the usefulness of the United Nations for peace, international understanding, and human rights. This, he said, was one of the most heartening signs of the time.

The Secretary-General, in Copenhagen, also paid tribute to Denmark for its continued contributions to the world of the United Nations.

Progress toward nuclear treaty possible says S-G

The UN Secretary-General, U Thant, told a press conference in Geneva last week that he thought some progress would be made this summer towards a comprehensive nuclear weapons test ban and curbs on the spread of atomic armaments. This, he said, was his personal assessment.

The Secretary-General had earlier exchanged views with the members of the Geneva Disarmament Conference, among them the Soviet Union and the United States.

Extending the existing anti-test treaty to underground nuclear detonations and the preventing of nuclear proliferation are the two main issues at present before the Conference, and U Thant expected "some perceptible progress" before the UN General Assembly meets this autumn.

Asked about Viet-Nam, U Thant said he knew of no new developments likely to bring about a peace conference. He reaffirmed that, in his view, a halt to bombing of North Viet-Nam, a general scaling down of all military operations in South Viet-Nam, and a willingness on the part of all to negotiate with those who are actually fighting were preconditions for peace discussions. U Thant said that his proposals during the last few months had in several quarters not not met with a positive response.

The Secretary-General said there were two divergent views on the origin of the conflict in Viet-Nam — One, that the whole trouble had started "with the so-called 'aggression' from the North"; the other, that the war was a civil war, like that in Spain in the 1930's, resulting in the introduction of massive foreign elements. He thought both views were over-simplifications, that the conflict's origins were related to the yearnings

of a long-suffering people for political independence without foreign interference. In such struggles for independence, he said, Communists, non-Communists, and anti-Communists had all participated — but if the fight was prolonged more extreme elements came to dominate the scene.

On Cyprus, U Thant noted that UN efforts for a political settlement had so far not been conclusive. Meanwhile, the most serious problem facing the UN Peace-Keeping Force in the island was financial; the system of voluntary contributions from States was very unsatisfactory, and he was not sure whether the UN would be able to keep the Force in the island beyond the end of the year. But, the Secretary-General added, that it was of course up to the Security Council to decide.

SOUTH Africa has informed the UN Secretary-General that it reserved its position on the validity of the resolution on Rhodesia adopted by the UN Security Council on 9 April because two of the Council's five permanent members — France and the Soviet Union — had abstained in the vote.

The resolution questioned by South Africa authorized Great Britain to use force, if necessary, to intercept tankers carrying oil presumably destined for Rhodesia in a breach of an embargo called for by the Council last November. Portugal who controls some of the access routes for these oil shipments, had already made known its reservations about the 9 April resolution. It drew attention to a UN Charter provision that decisions of the Security Council on all but procedural matters should be made with the "concurring votes" of the permanent Council members. This meant, it said, that a negative vote or an abstention of a permanent member prevented the Council from taking a positive decision.

Three die in accidents

Three members of the United Nations Force in Cyprus died last week as the result of accidents. The three men — all private soldiers — were from the Swedish, British and Canadian Contingents of the Force. One died in Famagusta hospital after getting into difficulties while swimming, one was electrocuted and the third killed in a traffic accident.

On Wednesday afternoon of last week, Private Jan Jönsson, aged 21, of Farlov, Sweden, got into difficulties whilst bathing off Fam-

gusta. Despite being brought ashore by three of his comrades and rushed to hospital he died early on the same evening. After a memorial service in Famagusta his body was flown to Sweden on Thursday morning.

At about 1000 hrs on Saturday a member of the British Contingent, Trooper John Joseph Synnott, aged 21, of Downpatrick, Northern Ireland, serving with the 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards, was accidentally killed by an electric shock in Zyyi Camp near Limassol.

Trooper Synnott had been with the Force since January this year.

Less than two hours later, Private Joseph Patrick Everett Bernard, aged 23, of Fredrickstown, Canada, serving with the 2nd battalion, The Black Watch (RHR) of Canada, was killed when the lorry he was driving overturned between Aghirda and Dhikomo in the Kyrenia District. Private Bernard was killed instantly. There were no other passengers in the vehicle.

his senior members. While there he had short talks with the Foreign Minister of Jordan (in Amman) and with the Foreign Minister of Israel. On Thursday last, he flew to Beirut where he talked with Mr. L. Michelmore, Director of the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees.

After his arrival, Mr. Bunche spent most of Friday afternoon at UNFICYP Headquarters where he conferred privately with Mr. Bernardes and General Martola and later attended a general operational briefing by senior UNFICYP Headquarters officers and by the commanders of the different contingents serving with the Force. He later was guest of the Force Commander at a small social gathering at the UNFICYP Hqs. Officers' Mess.

On Saturday morning, Mr. Bunche — accompanied by Mr. Bernardes and the Force Commander — called on the Foreign Minister, Mr. Kyprianou, and later met with the President of Cyprus, Archbishop Makarios, and the Foreign Minister. Later, he called on Dr. Fazil Kuchuck, Vice-President. Mr. Bunche was guest at a working luncheon given by Archbishop Makarios and in the evening he was guest at dinner with Dr. Kuchuck.

On Saturday afternoon, Mr. Bunche accompanied by Mr.

Bernardes and the Force Commander visited the area of Trypimeni. On Sunday, with General Martola, he watched the marshalling of a UNFICYP-escorted convoy to Kyrenia and later went to Kyrenia where he met with Mr. Bernardes and the Force Commander. In the afternoon, Mr. Bunche accompanied by the Force Commander visited Famagusta where he attended a military briefing at Famagusta Zone headquarters and later visited some of the Swedish-manned posts along the walls of the Old City of Famagusta.

On Monday morning, before departing for the airport, Mr. Bunche took time off to meet with all the civilian international staff members of the United Nations serving with UNFICYP. He thanked them — just as he had done so previously to the military staff members of Friday afternoon — for their continued devoted service to the cause of the United Nations in its efforts to maintain peace in Cyprus.

At the airport, before taking the plane that flew him to London, Mr. Bunche told reporters that he had a “fruitful” visit to Cyprus during which he had an opportunity to review fully the operations and activities of UNFICYP. “I have been talking almost continuously since I have been here,” he said, “with every-

body I have seen — UN people, Government people, Turkish leadership people, on the field at Trypimeni, at Kyrenia, at Famagusta — non-stop.”

Asked whether he had succeeded in working out an agreement concerning Trypimeni, Mr. Bunche said that was not the purpose of his visit. “As I said when I arrived,” he stated, “I was not here for political purposes, I was not here negotiating. The work here is done by Mr. Bernardes and General Martola.”

In a further indirect reply to the question, Mr. Bunche said that he had been impressed by his Sunday visit to Famagusta at the “very successful” manner in which the arrangement worked out by UNFICYP and in the implementation of which the UN is involved in that area which was seriously troubled last year.

“I am confident,” he added, “that the United Nations’ proposals for eliminating the tension and the danger in the Trypimeni area can work just as successfully as the arrangements at Famagusta had worked.”

Speaking of UNFICYP’s role, in general, Mr. Bunche said he thought the UN has had “remarkable success” in peace-keeping in the sense of — more or less — bringing an end to the shooting. “Now,” he added, “we are in another stage really, of trying to solve

the problem so there won’t be more shooting — so there won’t be any future need for peace-keeping. This is more difficult, always — it is always more difficult to make peace than to keep peace in United Nations experience.”

Questioned on the outlook of future negotiations, Mr. Bunche said that “obviously” the best way always is if the parties themselves “can sit down and work it out”. In this sense, he said it was “good” that some move in that direction is being made by the bilateral talks which he understood are going on between Greece and Turkey.

“The more you can get any of the parties involved in this dispute talking to each other the better,” Mr. Bunche said. “But where the situation — where they can’t talk or won’t talk to each other directly, well then the UN forms a channel of communication and that is precisely the role that Mr. Bernardes is playing. He is a link and he is constantly trying to narrow the gap. And that is essentially the UN role, always — to try to narrow the gaps, to close the differences between parties; get them together, to reason with them and to try to persuade them to follow the path of reason and good will.”

Mr. Bunche is scheduled to return to UN Headquarters in New York on 15 July.
