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Force Commander presents UN medal to Inspector Georg Kunkl.

U. N. MEDALS PRESENTED TO AUSTRIAN CIVPOL's

Members of the Austrian element serving with the United Nations Civilian Police attached to the UN Force in Cyprus became the first UNFICYP's to be presented U.N. service medals by Maj. Gen. I.A.E. Martola.

At a brief ceremony on Monday morning at UNFICYP Headquarters, seven Austrian police officers received their UN medals after serving three months with the United Nations Force in Cyprus.

Also present at the ceremony, was the Civilian Police Adviser, Supt. J. Hamilton, who introduced the police officers to the Force Commander.

Receiving UN medals were Captain Wilhelm Beier, Inspector Wilhelm Vranka, Inspector Friedrich Mueck, Inspector Erwin Hirschboeck, Inspector Franz Ewenaus, Inspector Franz Gaiswinkler and Inspector George Dunkl.

Austria contributes an element of 34 officers to the U.N. Civilian Police serving with UNFICYP.

S-G TO REPORT ON FORCE NEXT WEEK

A United Nations spokesman said at U.N. Headquarters in New York last week that the Secretary-General, U Thant, was expected to submit early next week a report to the Security Council on the United Nations peace-keeping operation in Cyprus.

Furthermore, the spokesman said, the Security Council was expected to meet later in the week to consider the question of Cyprus, and the possible extension of the mandate of the United Nations Peace-Keeping Force in Cyprus.

The stationing of the UN Force in Cyprus was last extended by a resolution adopted on 16 March by the Security Council for a three month period ending 26 June 1966. The resolution stated that the extension was being approved "in the firm hope that by the end of this period substantial progress towards a solution (of the Cyprus problem) will have been achieved."

The U.N. Force in Cyprus, as of last month, consisted of six national contingents contributed by Canada, Denmark, Finland, Ireland, Sweden and the United Kingdom, and an Austrian Field Hospital unit, with a combined military strength of 4,716 men.

In addition, attached to UNFICYP, is a United Nations Civilian Police force consisting of elements contributed from Australia, Austria, Denmark, New Zealand and Sweden.

Furthermore, approximately, 50 civilians from the United Nations international staff were working with the Force, making a total of 4,937 persons serving with the U.N. Force in Cyprus.

Brigadier M. Harbottle to Succeed Brig. 'Jim' Wilson

It was announced in London and at United Nations Headquarters in New York last week that the British Ministry of Defence had selected Brigadier M.N. Harbottle, OBE to succeed Brig. A.J. Wilson as Commander of the British Contingent serving with the United Nations Force in Cyprus.

Brig. Harbottle also succeeds Brig. Wilson as Chief of Staff of the UN Force in Cyprus.

The new UNFICYP Chief of Staff and Commander of BRITCON will arrive in Cyprus on

9 June and will assume command on 22 June 1966.

Brigadier Wilson will have completed an extended tour of duty of 18 months and since the death of General K.S. Thimayya last December was Acting Force Commander until the recent appointment of Maj. Gen. I.A.S. Martola as UNFICYP Commander.

On his return to the United Kingdom, Brigadier Wilson will take up command of 147 Infantry Brigade (TA), for which he was originally selected in August 1965.

CANADA'S SUPPORT OF PEACE-KEEPING EFFORTS Praised

In an address before the University of Windsor, the U.N. Secretary-General, U Thant, praised Canada for its stalwart support — in men and money — for various United Nations peace-keeping operations.

He said such operations were of major importance in dealing with the turbulent changes in the world today.

But chances that the U.N. would be able to meet this need in the future, he warned, were seriously jeopardized by disagreement on how such undertakings should be authorized, financed and administered.

AUSTRIA PLEDGES \$40,000 FOR UNFICYP COSTS

THE Government of Austria has informed the United Nations that it has decided to make a voluntary contribution of 40,000 dollars towards meeting the costs of the UN Peace-Keeping Force in Cyprus for the period of 27 December 1965 and 26 March 1966.

In a letter to UN Secretary-General U Thant, dated 23 May and sent by the Permanent Representative of Austria to the United Nations, Mr. Kurt Waldheim, Austria said that in making this contribution it would be grateful if this amount were compensated against the costs incurred by the Austrian Government in providing a medical and a police contingent for the UN Cyprus operation.

Austria is providing a Field Hospital unit to the Forces, composed of eight officers and 46 other ranks, as well as a civilian police element formed by 34 men.

BRITISH CONTINGENT:

'SIOUXS' FARE WELL IN OPERATION 'WESSEX'

Early last week two helicopters of 4 Air OP Troop Royal Artillery piloted by the OC, Major John Heath, and Captain Rod Canning carried out the routine resupply of the

Karmi Forest and Hilltop OP's in the Kyrenia District for the first time. This is usually the task of the much larger Wessex helicopters of 18 Squadron Detachment RAF; however the aim of the exercise was to see if resupply by the Sioux was a feasible operation.

Stores were lifted from the Oneisha Farm pad in panniers mounted on each side of the helicopters. Each "chopper" carried two panniers which could take three hundred and fifty pounds of freight. Loading and lashing was done with surprising speed by lads of the Troop under the watchful eye of Bombardier Chris Wilson of Llandindrod Wells, Wales.

The operation was going extremely smoothly when Major John Heath was called back to Nicosia for more urgent business with the Force Commander. In spite of this the lifting continued and the resupply was completed in a flying time of some 2½ hours.

The satisfactory execution of this task emphasised yet again the versatility and consequent value of the helicopter, be it large or small, in modern military operations.

UNICEF APPROVES AID TO NEEDY CHILDREN

In Addis Ababa, the Executive Board of the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) approved allocations of 28.3 million dollars for child-aid projects in 84 countries and territories.

About 60 per cent of the new aid is for health services and disease control campaigns.

Other important fields of assistance include education and vocational training, nutrition, and family and child welfare.

DECOLONIZATION COMMITTEE BACKS FORCE IN RHODESIA

The U.N. Committee on Decolonization last week approved a resolution calling upon Great Britain to use force if necessary to abolish the racist minority regime in Rhodesia.

The resolution also recommended that the Security Council request the United Kingdom to impose an armed blockade against Rhodesia to prevent any supplies, including oil, from reaching her.

Similar provisions were contained in a resolution turned down by the UN Security Council last month.

Action of the Decolonization Committee, taken at a meeting in Dar-es-Salaam, Tanzania, was approved by a vote of 18 in favor to one against — Australia — with Denmark, Italy and the United States abstaining. The United Kingdom is not represented at the current series of meetings in Africa.



18 SQUADRON DETACHMENT RAF, CHANGES OVER

ON 4th June a new detachment of 18 Sqn RAF stationed at RAF Gutersloh arrived at Nicosia by Argosy aircraft to relieve the present detachment who have completed their three months tour.

The incoming detachment is commanded by Flt Lt Clive Sillitoe (see above, right) and is nineteen all ranks strong.

Flt Lt Harry Marment is to stay for a further ten days to see the handover through, then he too will return to Germany.

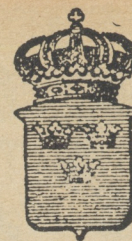

KEEPING THE WIRES BUZZING IN THE KYRENIA MOUNTAINS

THE complex problem of maintaining communications in Kyrenia District is handled by the Signals Platoon of the 2nd Battalion The Black Watch (RHR) of Canada.

Divided between Kyrenia and Camp Maple Leaf, near Nicosia, the platoon uses a variety of equipment to perform their task.

The telephone communications of the district link civilian switchboards with army field telephones through some hundreds of miles of temporary line and radio relay apparatus. As a back up to the telephone communications a com-

plete radio net is maintained throughout the District. The end result is that every outpost and every commander is in contact with the next highest headquarters through the two means for 24 hours a day.

The Platoon Commander, Lieutenant Don Bohun, assisted by his Platoon Sergeant, Stan Greeley and his Signals Sergeant, Bill Dew, supervises the operation of his platoon from the unit Signals Centre situated in the scenic Kyrenia mountain range. Sergeant Dew is in charge of a small detachment at Lizzard Flats (Camp Maple Leaf).

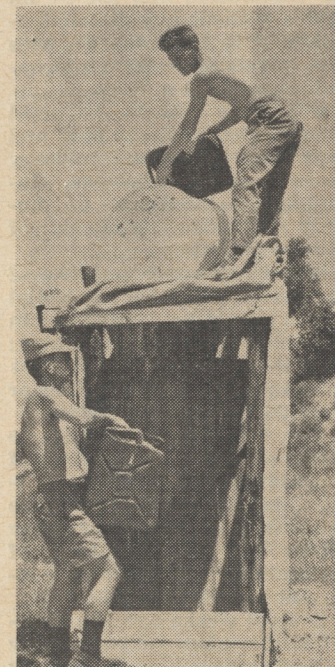

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U THANT NAMES GEN. TASSARA TO HEAD UNMOGIP

UN Secretary-General, U Thant, last week announced the appointment of General Luis Tassara Gonzalez of Chile as Chief Military Observer of the United Nations Military Observer Group in India and Pakistan.

General Tassara succeeds the late Lt. General Robert Nimmo of Australia who died in Rawalpindi in January of this year.

Since that time, Canada's Col. J.H.J. Gauthier has served as Acting Chief Military Observer.

SECRETARY GENERAL CONGRATULATES U.S. ON SURVEYOR 1

UN Secretary General, U Thant, sent a message of congratulations to President Johnson of the United States on last Thursday's moon landing of "Surveyor 1".

Noting the Soviet and U.S. statements on the need for an international agreement on the peaceful exploration of outer space, U Thant said these developments should give "renewed faith in our ability to work together towards the establishment of a meaningful peace in our planet."

USSR Bids UN Draft Space Exploration Treaty

The Soviet Union requested last week that the next U.N. General Assembly take up the question of concluding an international agreement to cover the exploration and the use of the moon and other celestial bodies.

The request is contained in a letter from the Soviet Foreign Minister, Mr. Andrei Gromyko, which was handed to the Secretary-General, U Thant, by Ambassador Nikolai Fedorenko last week.

The letter put forward four principles as a basis for the agreement:

● 1. The moon and other celestial bodies should be free for exploration and use by all States without any discrimination and in accordance with basic principles of international law.

● 2. They should be used for peaceful purposes only and kept free from any military bases or installations, including installations of nuclear and other weapons of mass destruction.

● 3. Exploration and use of the moon and other celestial bodies should be carried out in the interests of all mankind; and these bodies should not be subject to appropriation or any other territorial claims.

● 4. Exploration should be based on the principles of cooperation and mutual assistance, taking into account the respective interests of other States for the purpose of maintaining international peace and security.

Several weeks ago the United States also urged early U.N. discussions on a treaty which would include a provision for bringing any claim of sovereignty over celestial bodies and keeping them free from weapons of mass destruction and military maneuvers. The U.S. asked that such a treaty be worked out in the U.N. Committee on Outer Space, with a view to action by the General Assembly next fall.

Following publication of the Soviet letter, U.S. Ambassador Arthur Goldberg said in a press statement that his Government welcomed what ap-

peared to be "an affirmative interest" by the USSR in the U.S. proposal.

Ambassador Fedorenko emphasized that the Soviet Union had been the first to take an initiative in this field and had come forward with a series of constructive moves in recent years. He added that the position taken by the U.S. had not always been conducive to a positive solution.

PHILATELIC CORNER

— HOW MUCH ARE YOUR UN POSTAGE STAMPS WORTH?

ON 10 June this year the UN Postal Administration celebrates its fifteenth anniversary. The value of UN stamps has increased steadily over the years; especially during the past few months market prices have rocketed. For instance, one sheet each of the eleven regular stamps issued in 1951, with a face value of \$116.25, now cost \$995.00 from a stamp dealer.

One each of all the UN stamps issued to date, with a face value of \$15.08, sells for \$175.00 and can be purchased for \$210.00.

Two weeks ago, a philatelic journal said: "UN prices have increased 60 per cent in the past three months with no let-up in sight. Quite interestingly, it is the UN itself that has been responsible for this feverish activity..."

Why so much?

There are several reasons, according to David S. J. Alexander, President of the UN Philatelic Society.

In the first place, by and large the UN Postal Administration enjoys the confidence of the philatelic public. UN stamps are attractive and well publicized. There are many more UN collectors in the U.S. and overseas now than there were five or ten years ago. Any serious collector naturally wants to have his collection complete.

But some of the early issues were of limited printing — one or one and a half million stamps at most — so there aren't many around.

UN ASKED TO WITNESS VIET-NAM FALL ELECTIONS

The Republic of Viet-Nam last week asked the United Nations to send observers to witness the elections for a Constituent Assembly it is holding in September.

The request was made orally last Thursday morning to the Secretary-General, U Thant, by Ambassador Nguyen-Duy-Lein, the Republic of Viet-Nam's Permanent Observer at the U.N., and a formal letter followed in the afternoon. It was not immediately made public.

In a press statement issued by the Ambassador, he said his Government was determined to ensure that the people would be free to express their will and therefore wished the elections to be witnessed by "competent and impartial international observers." He added that he had assured the Secretary-General that they would receive a warm welcome and all necessary facilities. In his statement he said that he had asked U Thant to "make arrangements" for the dispatch of observers.

Late Thursday evening, the Secretary-General saw the current President of the Security Council, Ambassador Corner of New Zealand, and gave him a copy of the South Viet-Name letter. Mr. Corner told reporters later that evening that he would be in consultation with

Council Members on the matter.

In a press briefing on Friday morning at UN Headquarters in New York, a United Nations spokesman said that the Secretary-General felt he could not send observers to witness the September elections in the Republic of Viet-Nam without authorization of the Security Council or some other appropriate UN body.

The spokesman noted that the Viet-Name issue had been formally on the Council's agenda since early in February when it was inscribed at the request of the United States. This led at the time to private consultations between the Members but no Council action.

The UN spokesman also said there was no exact precedent for the requested observation mission, although the UN had watched elections in Korea after World War II and had supervised them in various Trust Territories.

In Washington, Ambassador Arthur Goldberg, U.S. representative to the United Nations announced President Johnson's "wholehearted" support of the Republic of Viet-Nam's request.

ASIA EDITORS URGE MORE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL NEWS

THE second Asian Editor's Round-Table, convened by the U.N. Office of Public Information in cooperation with the U.N. Economic Commission for Asia and the Far East (ECAFE) came to an end in Bangkok, Thailand last week.

The meeting brought together 21 representatives of leading newspapers, news agencies and broadcasting organisations, as well as senior officials of the United Nations and related agencies.

In a set of recommendations adopted at the end of the conference, the editors stressed the importance of public information for national development and the essential contribution it had to make towards narrowing the gap between the developing and the developed countries. They urged that information activities on economic and social matters should be "widespread, lucid and sustained" and should be recognized as an essential part of the nation's development efforts.

Singling out ECAFE's Asian highway project as an important rallying point for Asian development and promotion of regional interdependence, the Conference recommended that extensive regional publicity be given to the project.
